## THE LATEST DATA ON FEMALE CONDOM ACCEPTABLITY

Confirms: Female condoms have high acceptance rates, are in high demand by both women and men, and provide women with triple protection: with the FC2, they have the autonomy to protect themselves from unplanned pregnancy as well as STIs, including HIV & Zika.

## **SOUTH AFRICA**

Results from this study were published in the 20th Edition of the South African Health Review. Chapter 14: Twenty years of the female condom programme in South Africa: past, present, and future (Bekskinska et al., 2017). For the cohort study (598 females, 60 male partners) interviews were conducted at baseline, and follow-up interviews were conducted at one, six and 12 months.

The FC programme introduced in South Africa 20 years ago is now well established and embedded in the healthcare system; in particular, systems for MC and FC distribution are complementary, with similar ordering and reporting processes.

- Nearly 90% of men and women interviewed had heard of the FC, and approximately 20% had used it.
- Of the current FC users, 73.4% reported using condoms more often than before they started using FCs.
- At the I2-month interview, over half (53%) of the male partners reported that they were interested in and willing to try FCs when initially introduced to them by their partners and the majority (57%) said that FCs did not change their sexual experience.
- At six months into the research, 97% of women reported that their partners were supportive of using the FC (rising from 87% at their one-month interview).
- 80% of women at one month felt that FC use placed the woman in charge.
- The level of unprotected sex (no MC or FC use) declined from 43.3% at baseline to 8.4% at 12 months.
- The most commonly distributed FC was FC2 (99%), followed by Cupid (34%) and Pleasure More (2%). Female Health Company has provided training support on the FC2 in South Africa ever since it was first introduced.

At their one month interview, 58% of men said that the FC was 'better or much better' than the MC, and at 12 months this rose to 74%.


The FC2 female condom has been available in Uruguay since 2013. A pilot study and pilot scheme were commissioned by UNFPA Uruguay. Results from the **1st pilot study** (The Female Condom Satisfaction Study [Estudio de Satisfacción del Condon Feminino] (ESCF), Montevideo, 2014, 142 female participants):



- Those who used the FC2 rated it highly positive, even though it was practically unknown to the participants.
- 84% stated that they would continue using it in the future.
- According to the women, men also rated the FC2 female condom positively.
- The main advantage for women is that it provides them with autonomy.

Results from the **2nd pilot scheme**, which included training of health care providers, counselling services, guaranteed

access and restocking of the product, and M&E of the process (2015, 95 female participants, average age; 29):



77% of the women said the FC2 was good or very good.

• Study participants cited greater comfort and practicality and greater protection and safety as the two main advantages of FC2.

- 81% said that they would continue using FC2 in the future.
- 64% of women said they experience no difficulties at all.

Promotion of the FC2 in Uruguay forms part of a series of global and regional activities supporting the Comprehensive Condom Programme (CCP), on behalf of the United Nations System. The encouraging results from the pilot scheme have led to the first procurement of the female condom in the country.
